

Domestic Violence Defined Florida Statute 741.28

(2) <u>"Domestic violence"</u> means any assault, aggravated assault, battery, aggravated battery, sexual assault, sexual battery, stalking, aggravated stalking, kidnapping, false imprisonment, or any criminal offense resulting in physical injury or death of one <u>family or</u> household member by another family or household member.

"Family or Household Member" Defined Florida Statute 741.28

(3) **"Family or household member"** means spouses, former spouses, persons related by blood or marriage, persons who are presently residing together as if a family or who have resided together in the past as if a family, and persons who are parents of a child in common regardless of whether they have been married. With the exception of persons who have a child in common, the family or household members must be currently residing or have in the past resided together in the same single dwelling unit.



STATISTICS

- 1 in 3 women: victims of some form of physical violence by an intimate partner within their lifetime. 1 in 4 for men.
- PANDEMIC: increased dramatically National DV Hotline received 74,000 calls, chats, and texts in February 2022.

Fla. Stat. 741.28

- Petitioner v. Respondent
- Victim of DV or in imminent danger of becoming a victim of DV (PETITIONER)

RESPONDENT SHALL HAVE NO CONTACT WITH PETITIONER.



PROCESS

1. Petition for Injunction for Protection

- a. Domestic Violence
- b. Stalking
- c. Repeat Violence
- d. Sexual Violence
- e. Dating Violence
- 2. Judge can do one of 3 things:
 - a. Grant a temporary injunction
 - b. Deny
 - c. Set a Hearing

3. RETURN HEARING – within 15 days – for the

Court to determine:

- a. Grant Injunction and how long?
- b. Residence?
- 4. Other Considerations and wrinkles

CONSEQUENCES TO RESPONDENT

- Limit timesharing, require supervised timesharing, leave residence, pay child support
- Cannot possess firearms/ammo
- Professions, Licenses, Military, College Admission, US Citizenship
- Enforcement across 50 states
- Violations of DV Injunctions subject to criminal case


