JUDGE LATIMORE: Hi, I'm Judge Latimore.

MS. BAKER: Hi, I'm Shenise Baker.

JUDGE LATIMORE: And you're listening to 9th Unplugged.

JUDGE LATIMORE: So before we get unplugged, tell me your name and the department you work in for the 9th Circuit.

MS. BAKER: Shenise Baker, and I work for Judge Alvaro, he's a circuit judge.

JUDGE LATIMORE: And what's your position?

MS. BAKER: I am his judicial assistant.

JUDGE LATIMORE: And what does all of that entail?

MS. BAKER: Oh, a whole lot.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Whole lot.

MS. BAKER: A whole lot.

JUDGE LATIMORE: What's the most exciting part about your job?

MS. BAKER: The exciting part about my job. I think working with the amount of people that we work with. We work with assistants. We work with attorneys. And I definitely love working for my judge. He's great.

JUDGE LATIMORE: All right, he is great. I'm glad you were able to join us. So let's go ahead and get unplugged and talk about you a little bit more. Where are you from?

MS. BAKER: I'm from St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands but I was raised on St. Croix. JUDGE LATIMORE: Oh, okay. And did you like St. Thomas or St. Croix the most? MS. BAKER: I like St. Thomas the most.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay. And why is that? Why is that so special?

MS. BAKER: There is a little bit more happening there. St. Croix is a lot laid back, very agricultural, so not much to do there.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay and when is it that you moved to Orlando?

MS. BAKER: I moved to Orlando almost eight years ago, back in 2013.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay. And since you've been here, like what is the most exciting thing you've done in Orlando? Tell me about that.

MS. BAKER: The most exciting.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Yes, this booming city. What do you do?

MS. BAKER: The booming city. You know what, I really enjoy the parks. I love water parks. I have been to all of the parks. I used to be a pass holder but I'm not anymore.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Used to be what?

MS. BAKER: A pass holder.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay.

MS. BAKER: For most of the parks. But I really do enjoy the parks.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay, and how do you like this heat? You're used to it though with St. Croix and St. Thomas, but it's kind of different.

MS. BAKER: It's a different heat. And it's also very humid here. In the Islands, you had the trade winds that blow so the breeze is awesome down there.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Yeah. I'd really like to visit those lovely Islands. I'd like you to tell me just what you do when you're not at work.

MS. BAKER: I enjoy baking. I really enjoy baking. Also, DIY projects. I'm always working on something, doing something. In fact, the wreath to my office door, I made that myself.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Oh, wow.

MS. BAKER: Also enjoy dancing, yoga now.

JUDGE LATIMORE: What type of dancing do you do?

MS. BAKER: Just about everything but not so much formally anymore. But I really enjoy hip-hop, dance hall, Solka music.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay. Is that something that you learned at a young age and that's your, you know, just your hobby?

MS. BAKER: Yeah, I think my stepmom put me in the Caribbean dance school when I was three, maybe so it's been a love since then. I didn't stay with them very long but I've definitely enjoyed dancing over the years.

JUDGE LATIMORE: Okay. What do you hope you'll change about yourself as a person in the future?

MS. BAKER: In the future. I want to be more mindful about the way I treat others and also I want to be more invested in my family and friends. I find that so much time goes by and you lose contact with people and, especially this year, I've made it my goal to make sure that I call my stepmom and I call my step – not my stepdad but my dad more often. JUDGE LATIMORE: I think having this experience with the pandemic helped a lot of us realize how much more attention we need to give to maintain those relationships, right.

MS. BAKER: Very true.

MS. BAKER: That is really good.

But I was there with my dad and my siblings and he ordered it. JUDGE LATIMORE: Now has your life been any different than you would imagine it to be when you were growing up?

MS. BAKER: It is.
